Ask the Expert

"There are three teachers of children: adults, other children, and their physical environment."

I recently went on an architectural 'field trip' with parents, administrators, and (of course) architects seeking to reimagine our school's facilities. We toured the Valley—over 100 miles of driving, crisscrossing from Glendale to Mesa to Downtown Phoenix and back—to see and reflect on spaces that are used to define a learning environment. As our group travelled through rooms and buildings, my mind kept wandering back to a single concept: how is this space teaching those who occupy it?

One example occurred at the ASU Polytechic Campus. As we traversed the paths between buildings, indigenous plants and seemingly natural arroyos created a perfect outdoor classroom environment for young learners. I could imagine students sketching the path of water as it passed through the rocks and over ledges. I could picture them sitting on a small ledge to get a better look at a cluster of plants crowded underneath. In this context, children will naturally become aware of their environment and the rich diversity of life that occurs around them; these surroundings help to define their understanding of our desert landscape.

Another example was at a school that had small holes cut out of the doors, filled with glass. The architect explained that as the sun began to set, light would stream through the holes and create mottled lighting inside the building. Similarly, holes were cut out of many shade structures outside allowing pinpoints of light to meander across the walkways throughout the day. These simple, thoughtful touches cause students to notice things they may never have otherwise!

This notion is not just for schools; indeed, it is just as critical to reflect upon the environment of your own home as you watch your little ones grow. Are there opportunities for exploration of light and shadow, color and texture?

Here are a few simple ideas to engage your children more actively in the environment at home:

- Think of what is 'accessible' in your home at the eye-level of your child. For an adult, a picture or object five feet off the ground can be interesting for a child, it must be much lower to get their attention.
- Hang objects from string or fishing line in windows to catch natural light in interesting ways—translucent objects, old CDs, even small toys can be used to cast light and shadow in such a manner to spark curiosity.
- As your children learn to crawl, think of how you can lay out textured fabrics or objects in your home. A small, rubber mat or rough carpet can provide just as much sensory input as a soft blanket or squeaky toy—if not more, since it will provide a novel experience.

The world of our children is one full of wonder and novelty. It is important to provide variety and choice regarding the activities and materials available, and observe what holds your child's attention. When you see that he or she is drawn to an object or activity for an extended period of time, capitalize on that interest and help your child explore it further. Every day is an opportunity for them to experience something new.

# Making Relaxation Part of Children's Lives

Weekday mornings, Maria awakens, gets washed and dressed, eats breakfast, and brushes her teeth in the 45 minutes before her mother drives her to preschool. There she spends mornings and afternoons participating in the business of playing, learning and socializing. After preschool, Maria is off to dance lessons one day a week and to gymnastics on another day. Evenings are busy with dinner, bath, stories and the hectic schedule of older siblings.

Such is the life of many preschoolers. Gone are the carefree days of leisurely play, of unscheduled hours that could be filled with alternating rhythms of physical activity and such leisurely pursuits as lying in the grass, imagining creatures in the clouds.

Not only are today's young children maintaining busier, adult-like schedules, but they are also confronted with stresses and anxieties that their predecessors could never have imagined.

#### LEARNING TO RELAX

More than ever, children need to know how to relax. They must be able to find a quiet place inside themselves that allows them to cope – in order to maintain control of their bodies and feelings. Just "resting" is generally not enough; children must be capable of immersing themselves in total relaxation. Though most would agree relaxation is beneficial, many people are unaware relaxation is a learned skill; it must be encouraged and practiced. Moreover, relaxation must be valued by the important adults in children's lives. If it is, children are more likely to take some quiet time during the course of each busy day to "turn everything off."

### BENEFITS OF RELAXATION

More and more, researchers are discovering the correlation between stress and physical and mental illnesses. This means the child who does learn to relax will have the ability to manage stress and, therefore, live a healthier, more energetic life.

On a more basic level, experience with relaxation helps children gain greater motor control and have more control over their bodies in general. If imagery is used to encourage relaxation, the child's ability to imagine is enhanced. Similarly, if music is used to encourage relaxation, the child is exposed to the world of quiet, peaceful music. This can result in a greater appreciation for aesthetics – heightening the child's awareness of, and sensitivity to, beauty. And lastly, tension control helps children learn better!

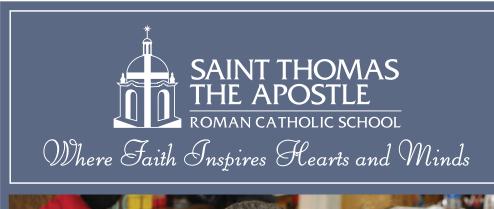

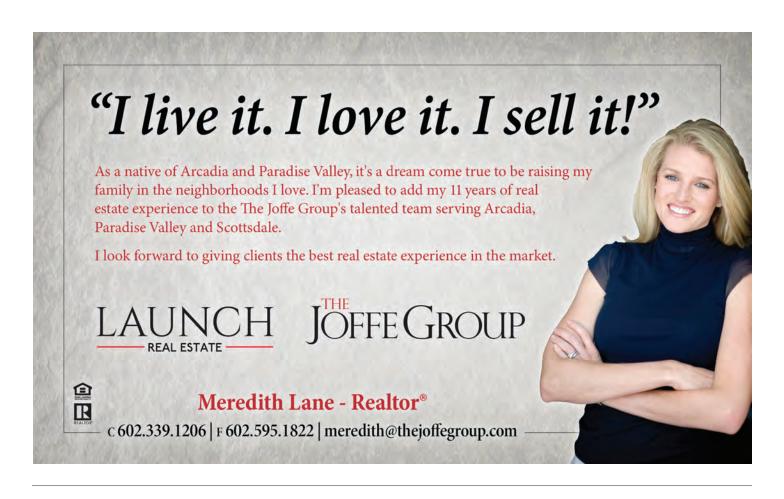

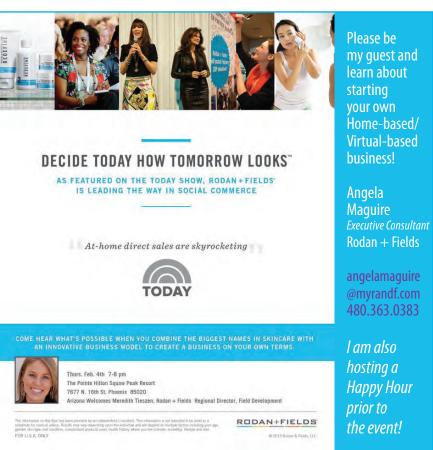

# Toilet Roll Love Bugs for Valentine's Day From RedTedArt.com

#### WHAT YOU NEED:

- Toilet rolls or paper towel rolls cut to various sizes
- Paint
- Googly eyes
- Pipe cleaners
- Beads
- Construction paper
- Tacky craft glue
- Marker pens

# **OPTIONAL EXTRAS:**

- Pom Poms

- Scissors

- Skewer

- Glitter/Glitter Glue Pens
- Stickers
- Washi Tape









#### **HOW TO MAKE:**

- Paint rolls and allow them to dry.
- Cut to various heights.
- Have an adult poke six holes with a kitchen skwer fo the pipe Icearn legs to go through. Simple poke the skewer in one side and out the other three times!
- Cut two pipe cleaners in half to get four pieces. Use three of the pieces to thread throught the holes to make six legs, then attach a small bead to each end to create hands and feet.
- Use washi tape, stickers, markers, glitter, glue, etc. to decorate



# Pizza Party Lollipops (makes 16 Iollipops)

#### WHAT YOU NEED:

- 1 pound pizza dough
- 1/2 pound fontina cheese, grated
- 16 wooden popsicle sticks
- 16 pepperoni slices, or other desired toppings
- pizza sauce, for dipping

### **HOW TO MAKE:**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 450F.
- 2. Divide the pizza dough into 16 pieces and roll each into a ball.
- 3. Insert a wooden popsicle stick into the center of each pizza dough ball, flatten into a disk, and place on a parchment paper lined baking sheet.
- 4. Sprinkle grated cheese onto each pizza lollipop, top with a pepperoni slice or other desired toppings, and extra cheese.
- 5. Place the pizza lollipops in the oven and bake for 25-30 minutes, until the cheese is melted and the pizza dough is golden brown.

Accompaniments: optional toppings: pepperoni, diced ham, olives, mushrooms

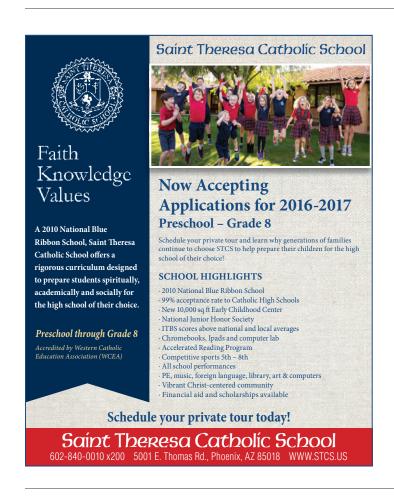
